New Heights Charter School of Brockton (NHCSB) Launches "Free Fresh Market" to Support Friends and Families with Healthy Food Access

Staying true to our mission of preparing all students for college—and recognizing that we are both a school and a community—New Heights Charter School of Brockton launched a new community-based initiative early last month: the New Heights Free Fresh Market. On Saturday, April 12, 2025, the school officially hosted its first Free Fresh Market, distributing fresh produce and pantry staples to more than 175 families. Our supplies were depleted within an hour! This overwhelming turnout underscores the vital need for programs like this, particularly in underserved communities.

At New Heights, community engagement is not just a bonus—it is central to the school's mission. By supporting the well-being of students and their families outside the classroom, the school strengthens the foundation for academic success and builds a stronger, healthier neighborhood.

To continue meeting this urgent need, New Heights has held additional Free Fresh Market events on April 19th, May 3rd, and the final Free Fresh Market was on May 17th. All events are open to New Heights families on a firstcome, first-served basis. From the school's main entrance, we have relocated the market to the school cafeteria to better serve our families. We have served over 200 families in each of the last two markets.

As the Principal, I know that when we take care of our families' immediate needs, we also set our students up for success, for I know an empty stomach is an enemy of the learning experience. No child should be left behind because of hunger.

The Free Fresh Market initiative is designed to address food insecurity by providing New Heights families with access to fresh, healthy food at no cost. This initiative reflects the school's deep commitment to serving and uplifting families. I also thank the New Heights community for their support and their dedication to serving our families with love, grace, and dignity.


